Rare Disease Day is a global movement dedicated to creating equity in social opportunities, healthcare, and access to diagnosis and treatments for people with rare diseases.

Since 2008, it has been observed every year on 28 February (or 29 February in leap years - the rarest day!).

Why zebras? Zebras represent rare diseases, such as primary immunodeficiency (PI).

In medical school, doctors are taught to look for common illnesses first when someone is sick. They are told "when you hear hoofbeats, think of horses, not zebras." But sometimes, doctors need to think about zebras too! For people with PI, being a zebra means having a condition that isn't common, but it's just as important for doctors to notice and understand.
